WET OR DRY? WHICH IS BEST?

I wish that I could report that the transition to becoming an alcohol-free fraternity by July 1, 2000, was an easy task, but the situation involves much more than just agreeing to abide by a new policy.

On September 18, a “developmental” weekend retreat was conducted by our Province President, a General Council Member, the Director of the Alcohol-free Housing Initiative, and a traveling Chapter Consultant. Upon questioning them, I was informed that our chapter was the *only* chapter in the country that was receiving such intense treatment and, while some subjects such as chapter scholarship, pledge training and pledge hazing were also discussed, the subject receiving the real emphasis was how Pennsylvania Theta should and could overcome the “perceived” obstacles of being a dry house.

I voiced my opinion that prohibition has never worked in the past, and that I saw no reason why it should be expected to work now. Alcohol by itself is not a problem; the abuse of alcohol is because it easily leads to *irresponsible* social actions. But, Phi Delta Theta is a social fraternity and its goal should be the *responsible* consumption of alcohol which is an established part of both undergraduate and postgraduate present-day life. Again in my opinion, we should be working on teaching proper social attitudes and guiding undergraduates into the responsible use of alcohol. This guidance might properly include some imposed restrictions or limitations, but not complete prohibition. It is obvious to me that this edict by the General Council will have the effect of producing alumni who will not be able to blend into the postgraduate world as well as they could have if their undergraduate experiences had included a well disciplined mix of alcoholic and non-alcoholic social activities.

Even though the current schedule for alcohol-free fraternities at Penn State includes 14 chapters by 2005, there are none who are going dry as quickly as we are being forced and, additionally, I am skeptical of that schedule. The earlier alcohol-free proclamations by Sigma Nu and Phi Gamma Delta have already been significantly modified and may *never* be fully implemented.

The latest pledge class of nine Phikeias seems like a great bunch of students, and they fully understand that we will not be able to have any alcohol on the premises for any reason after this summer. However, they numbered only nine, not 15 or more as was desired to keep the chapter membership up to the point of financial stability. Unfortunately, the indicated

HOUSE MAKING CHANGES

Right now is the time, the time when we must begin to alter our ways. Wait. Are we really? Some — no, most — believe that our existence in the past was because of the presence and lure of alcohol. Without it, we will dwindle and die in what our society has named one of the most Greek and party-oriented schools in the United States. Others, we hope, see it as an opportunity, perhaps a blessing, a cleansing of society. I don’t know, but what I do know is that it is reality.

In every part of our house the transitions can be seen. Our social activities have been directed toward bettering our relations with the other Greeks organizations so that we may still enjoy the

reason for the refusal of many highly rated rushees to accept a pledge bid is the prohibition of alcoholic beverages starting this summer. In addition, this new policy has caused some upper-classmen to announce that they will move out of the house next year.

This is of great concern to our alumni corporation because, as the landlord, it must rely on the rental income paid by the undergraduate chapter. While the general operational expenses of the house are paid directly by the undergraduate chapter and are mostly proportional to its occupancy, most of the expenses of the alumni corporation (other than physical plant maintenance) are fixed and are dependent on the undergraduate chapter's ability to pay the established amount of rent in a timely manner.

Now that you have my opinions on Pennsylvania Theta becoming an alcohol-free facility (remember, it will include *all* activities including Homecoming), I would be very appreciative if I could learn the collective opinion of our alumni membership.

Please write to me (snail-mail, e-mail or fax) and give me your opinions, suggestions and/or instructions, but keep in mind that outright rejection of the General Council's order would probably leave us with only two alternatives, disaffiliation from Phi Delta Theta or closure of the chapter followed by a sale of the property.

For those of you who are still confused about our property, we do not have, nor did we *ever* have, a 99-year lease. We own the real estate and could sell it. However, there are deed and zoning restrictions that would strongly influence any such sale.
